## From the Head

Our Department has a half century tradition of curiosity driven basic research by physician/scientists allied to a strong graduate education program. We have begun the Robert Hall More Academic Education Trust to enhance the educational resources of the department with an emphasis on graduate students and the Nathan Kaufman Lectureship Trust to fund an annual visiting

lectureship focused on basic research. We are working with the Queen's Development Office on a funding strategy and no surprise - you will be hearing more within a few months.



# A researcher's guide to ORDCF/CFI

Queen's University is poised to capitalize on two major new programs that foster research leading to innovation.

The Canada Foundation for Innovation (CFI) and the Ontario R& D Challenge Fund (ORDCF), announced by

the federal and provincial governments respectively in their 1997 budgets, offer Queen's the potential for major new funding to upgrade buildings and equipment, attract top researchers and build on areas of excellence, says Suzanne Fortier, Vice-Principal (Research).

The federal government's commitment of \$800 million to research infrastructure over the next five years, combined with Ontario's pledge of \$500 million to research and development over the next 10 years, have similar mandates and priorities, she notes: to cultivate world-class research, to foster job creation and economic growth, and to encourage collaboration among research institutions and between these institutions and the private sector.

Targeted disciplines by both CFI and ORDCF are applied and pure sciences, health sciences and environmental studies (sciences), although the process at Queen's encourages proposals that also include contributions from the humanities and social sciences, where appropriate.


#### **Canada Foundation for Innovation**

What is it?

The CFI's mandate is to increase the capability of Canadian universities, colleges, hospitals and other eligible institutions to carry out world-class scientific research and technology development. To implement this mandate, the CFI will promote







innovation by investing in research infrastructure, jointly with funding partners.

Conditions: Funding partnership with the private and voluntary sectors, and provincial governments. Partners must provide 50-60 percent of total project cost. Funding: \$800m up front, with accrued interest. Targeted areas: Health, environment, science, engineering.

Who is eligible: Canadian universities, colleges, hospitals and other non-profit organizations that have demonstrated their capability to support and conduct research.

Application: By institutions, not by individual researchers.

What qualifies for funding: Physical infrastructure only. Infrastructure is defined as "equipment, specimens, scientific collections, computer software, information databases, communication linkages, and other intangible properties used or to be used primarily for carrying on research including housing and installations essential for the use and servicing of those things."

# Ontario R&D Challenge Fund

What is it?

The ORDCF's objectives are to support job creation and economic growth; to promote

world-class research of interest to the private sector; encourage

more collaboration between private sector and research institutions; improve Ontario's ability to attract and keep world-class researchers and skilled technicians, and conduct state-of-the-art research; and to help Ontario universities and other research institutes compete for funding from the Canada Foundation for Innovation and other federal research programs.

Conditions: Partnership with the private sector, and matching contributions from the institution.

Funding: \$50m per year over 10 years


Targeted areas: All disciplines, but especially health and environmental sciences, natural sciences and engineering and mathematics.

Who is eligible: Universities, research-oriented health care facilities and other research institutes.

Application: By institutions, not by individual researchers.

What qualifies for funding: Equipment and facilities (re-equipping, renovation, construction); data bases; funded or endowed research chairs or faculty positions; skilled technical personnel.
