INFECTIOUS VACCINES

A novel vaccine derived from recumbent DNA that is not infectious, but easily spread, is the Hepatitis B banana (Wall Street Journal. March 9, 1994:B6). A protein from the coat of the Hepatitis B virus has been inserted into the banana plant, creating a transgenic banana that expresses hepatitis antigens in the edible fruit. The hope is that eating bananas from this plant will provide immunization against the Hepatitis B virus. This novel vaccine is being developed as a less expensive delivery system compared to the current series of three injections. Will it be "prescribed" for individuals - or released to protect entire populations at risk? The thought of health protection delivered by Tropicana or Dole is certainly a novel one. Let us await peaches against pertussis, cauliflowers against cholera, and tomatoes against tetanus!

Members of the Queen's community are invited to name the new fitness area in return for some great prizes. Details: Queen's Athletics and Recreation Department.





Louis and Artur Lucian Award




Observations From A Conference

Microbiology, Infection Control and Infectious Diseases have all moved to Douglas 3. Phone numbers have not changed.

Province announces hospital restructuring

Hotel Dieu and St. Mary's of the Lake hospitals will close under hospital restructuring plans announced Feb. 23 by the province. Kingston General Hospital will be expanded and renovated as the primary acute-care facility in the region under the new plan, with Kingston Psychiatric Hospital taking on ambulatory care, walk-in emergency and some long-term care services. Services currently offered at St. Mary's will move to KGH and KPH. Services at Hotel Dieu will move to KPH. The provincial restructuring committee says the new plan will save the province

about \$50 million. The new plan is expected to take effect by April, 2000.

Parkinson Foundation of Canada (PFC)

Schizophrenia Society of Canada

In 1993, Dr. Michael Smith generously donated \$250,000 of his Nobel Prize for the training of scientists in the area of molecular genetics of the central nervous system with special emphasis on schizophrenia. To achieve excellence in research a close cooperation with the MRC was suggested. Applicants must be Canadian, hold a PhD or health professional degree and meet the MRC's criteria for excellence. The value of the award is equivalent to the MRC Fellowship stipends. Deadline for applications is **April 1 and November 1** using the MRC 18 application form. DON'T Join This Crew!

A number of people at Queen's and KGH have asked about a message warning against a so-called e-mail virus called "Join the Crew".

According to the Computer Incident Advisory Capability (CIAC), this is yet another example of an Internet hoax. "For a virus to spread, it must be executed. Reading a mail message does not execute the mail message.... Reading e-mail, using typical mail agents, cannot activate malicious code delivered in or with the message."

The CIAC recommends that if you receive such a message, and it has an attachment, you delete both the message and the attachment. If you receive just the message, delete the message.

Please DO NOT circulate unvalidated virus alerts.

Netscape Navigator:

Current versions of Netscape Navigator currently running in the Dept. Range from v2.02 to v4.04 The newer versions require much more hardware to run (drive space, CPU and RAM) and in many cases will not run on lower end machines, and in some cases won't run on the higher ones either. Netscape recently stopped charging for the browser software and released the source code. What this means is that temporarily at least we won't be seeing any newer versions of it.


