



The M. Daria Haust Trust Fund Application: Opportunities for Special Travel

Applications are once again invited for the above mentioned fund. The Terms of Reference are to provide educational leaves for faculty members with primary appointments for continuing education and research. The Committee of **Bob Kisilevsky**, **Dave Lillicrap and Susan Cole** will focus on those leaves which will enable faculty to significantly increase their expertise in a particular area or to learn a special technique. These funds will be seen as supplementary to existing travel and research funds and can only be expended by the individual faculty member.

The application should consist of a one page letter defining the purpose of the trip and the value to the individual faculty member and to the department and a detailed estimate of the expenses. Applications may be made now for the academic year 2001-2002 and should be submitted to my office by **April 20th**.

We are restricting the total payment from the Fund to \$6,500 for this year and expect that this will increase to \$10,000 in subsequent years. The maximum grant this year will be \$4,000.



r. Dexter's Corner Between Never and Always

A recent haematology round deteriorated rapidly into an argument about occ.. It was in relation to a smear comment where the LIS had attributed the quirky comment of occ. fragments to the case. Fully ten minutes of furious discourse ensued as to what the use of "occasional" really inferred. No compromise was achieved despite the presence of Canadians in the group and personal perceptions seem to rule. 'In exemplum', "occasional" to Clinton would seem excessive to most, a theme most recently elaborated in a Op-Ed piece (National Post March 12, p. A14 "King Bill and the other guy").



A recent regional-based research project submitted for publication by Hookey, Lee and Dexter reviewed and documented the variation in morphology terms and their quantification noting the nonstandardization of both across the system. Under the intriguing subtitle of "Verbal Specifications of Frequency Have No Place in Medicine" Nakao and Axelrod expanded on the notion. (Am. J. Med. 1983:74:1061-1065). Greater consensus was achieved amongst native English-speaking physicians than by these of other native languages. Graduates of North American medical schools showed less range than Foreign Medical Graduates. Board certification did not help. Sentences from articles such as "this indicates that cases of unexplained pulmonary hypertension, although certainly uncommon, are not exceedingly rare" leave the reader conceptually confused.

A survey using common modifiers was undertaken of 103 physicians and 106 non-physicians. They were asked to attach a numerical value for each of the modifiers (see adjacent graph). "Occasional", the modifier which stimulated this essay, ranged between 8-40% with a median of 30% for physicians and 33% for non-MD's.

Robert Kenney from the Mass. General did a similar survey (NEJM 305:1097-1098, 1981). "Occasional" ranged from 4.4 - 34.6% but the category "on occasion" ranged from 5.8-18.8%. In neither of the surveys did "always" or "invariably" equate to a fully agreed standard of 100% although the reproducibility was more precise with extreme modifiers.

There is of course, racial variation. An American indicating loss of hair with age has spotted a hair fibre or two on his brush. An Englishman bemoaning the loss of a hair or two is probably as bald as a billiard ball and could serve as a part-time lighthouse beacon.

A purported conversation with the noted philosopher Sir Bertrand Russell went as follows. On visiting his rooms in university, a friend, spotting a bowl of fruit on a table asked...

Direct Export allows users of ISI ResearchSoft's bibliographic management software to more easily export citations from Ovid Web Gateway Search sessions. This feature has been automatically activated for all Ovid Online Customers. Direct Export will also be available in our upcoming Local OvidWeb Software Release Version 4.1.1.

A new output format choice called "Direct Export" is now offered in the Citation Manager. Once Direct Export is chosen, users should then click on the "Save" button in the Action column. Doing so will automatically launch the ISI ResearchSoft bibliographic software. Users will then be prompted to choose a file to which they wish to export the citations.

Ovid's Direct Export feature is compatible with EndNote4, ProCite 5/4/3 or Reference Manager 9/8/7, though some versions of the bibliographic software may require the installation of a plug-in, or require users to download additional filter files. 


Figure 7 - Microsoft Hidden Configuration Settings

doors to the conference rooms are often wide open at that


time, having been left that way all night (it's not the janitorial staff... I've asked). Luckily our audio-video equipment has been still there.


Access can be made by case number, keyword search or case search, browsing by case number and browsing by photograph number.
